in milk and beaten egg; then add butter. Fill tiny buttered muffin tins about one-third full of batter. On this drop a little marmalade or jelly. Cover with batter, filling tins about two-thirds full. Bake in a moderate oven about 15 minutes. Serve hot.

Cheese Sandwiches

Cut bread three-quarters of an inch thick into small squares or rounds. Butter and pile with cream cheese mixed with salad dressing. Sprinkle finely chopped nuts; olives green pepper; pimento or watercress.

Combine one 3-ounce package of cream cheese with two cups minced ham and 1/2 cup chopped watercress. Add salad dressing to moisten. Spread generously on whole wheat bread. Cut in fingers.

Cheese Squares

Cut fruit bread in squares (about 1 1/2 inches). Blend together grated cheddar cheese with sufficient butter to make a soft mixture. Spread the four sides and top of the bread squares with the mixture. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in hot oven or under broiler until cheese begins to melt.

Cheese Shortbread

2 1/4 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup butter
1 small bar cream cheese

Sift together flour and salt. Cut in butter. Blend in soft cheese and work into compact dough. Chill. Roll thin. Cut with cookie cutter. Bake in moderate oven from 5 to 15 minutes. When serving put together with marmalade or red currant jelly.

Two and one-half cups cake flour;
1 teaspoon soda; 1/4 teaspoon salt;

1 cup butter or other shortening; 2 cups sugar; 5 eggs, well beaten; 3 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted; 1 cup sour milk or butter-milk; 2 teaspoons vanilla. Sift flour once, measure, add soda and salt, and sift together 3 times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually and cream until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well, then chocolate and blend. Add flour, alternately with milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla. Bake in greased loaf pan, 15 by 9 by 2 inches, in slow oven 50 minutes, or until done. Remove cake from pan, cut in halves crosswise and trim to straighten edges. Put together with toasted almond filling between layers and mocha chocolate frosting on top and sides of cake. Decorate on top with shredded toasted almonds, if desired.

Magic Crunches

One and one-third cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk; 3 cups graham cracker crumbs; 1/2 pound (1 cup) pitted dates; 1 teaspoon cinnamon.

Thoroughly blend together sweetened condensed milk, graham cracker crumbs, chopped dates and cinnamon. Drop by spoonfuls on buttered baking sheet. Bake in moderately hot oven 15 minutes or until brown. Remove from pan at once. Makes 36.

**ALBERTA MEMBER GUILTY OF
DEFAMATORY LIBEL**

EDMONTON—J. H. Unwin, Social Credit member of the Alberta Legislature for Edson, has been convicted in the Supreme Court of publishing a "defamatory libel knowing it to be false." After an hour's deliberation the jury of six men brought in this verdict of guilty with a recommendation for leniency. The libel was contained in a pamphlet published by the accused entitled "Bankers Teadies." It named nine Edmonton men.

**DOMINION TO INSTITUTE PLAN
FOR UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF**

Premier Mackenzie King has sent out a call to the nine provinces of the Dominion, asking for their approval of an amendment to the British North America Act, which would enable the passage of an Unemployment Insurance scheme to be administered by the Dominion Government.

The Minister of Labor said it might be fair to assume that the scheme would be on a contributory basis, and he also intimated that the Dominion Government would probably be prepared to accept responsibility, administrative and financial for the operation of an insurance plan, if the Provinces agreed to give the Dominion jurisdiction in this field. Under the present Constitution the Provinces have jurisdiction over such social services.

The Unemployment and Social Insurance Act passed by the Parliament of 1936 was found unconstitutional by the Supreme Court and then by the Privy Council, as it invaded the rights of the provinces.

The Premier believes that if the present plan was backed by the approval of the provinces, a joint resolution of the House of Commons and the Senate, the necessary amendment would be quickly passed.
