THE HOUSEWIFE

HAM LOAF

Two pounds chopped, cooked ham from picnic ham, 2 cups bread crumbs, 1 tablespoon grated onion, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 cup tomato soup, 3 eggs, 1 teaspoon mustard, 1 teaspoon horseradish. Combine all ingredients, mix well and form into loaf. Bake in a loaf cake pan, well-greased, in a moderate oven, about 3/4 hour. Serve hot with horseradish sauce, or raisin sauce.

YORKSHIRE PUDDING

Measure 1 cup sifted flour—add 1/2 teaspoon salt, and sift again. To 2 well-beaten eggs add 1 cup milk, stir eggs and milk gradually into flour. Beat mixture for 2 1/2 minutes. Pour mixture into hot greased muffin tins. Bake in hot oven. Cook until well browned, and serve at once.

CARROT PUDDING

Seven-eighths cup flour, 1/2 teaspoon soda, pinch of salt, 1/2 cup chopped suet, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup seeded and chopped raisins, 2 tablespoons shredded, candied peel, juice and rind of 1/2 lemon, 1/2 cup grated raw potato, 1/2 cup grated raw carrot, 1/2 cup grated raw apples, 3/4 teaspoon mixed spice, 1/2 cup currants. Mix and sift dry ingredients, add suet and fruit; mix well; add vegetables; mix well. Steam in buttered, tightly covered mould for three hours. 1/4 cup blanched chopped almonds may be added.

MAGIC PEANUT COOKIES

One and one-third cups (1 can) sweetened condensed milk, 1 cup dried apricots, 3 cups shelled peanuts, 2 teaspoons lemon juice. Thoroughly blend sweetened condensed milk and apricots, which have been washed and put through food chopper. Fold in chopped peanuts and lemon juice. Drop by spoonfuls on buttered baking sheet. Bake in moderately slow oven 20 minutes or until brown. Remove from pan at once. Makes about 36.

CARIBOO'S MEMBER MAKES MAIDEN SPEECH IN HOUSE

(Continued from page 4)

Co-operative Commonwealth, in which the state will come before and above self, and all will labor as regimented units for the profits of the socialistic state. There is no member on the floor of this House but will agree that it is a lovely theory, yet the story of the Cariboo, and the story of the men who actually ventured, who sweated, who toiled, and died, contradicts the theory by practice. They were rugged individuals, those stout pioneers who overcame the many hazards of the North, and who created a great and fertile land out of a crying wilderness. Cariboo, Cameron, Dutch Bill, Bill Barker, Scotch Johnny, to name a few who played for big stakes, but played alone.

I cannot conceive, Mr. Speaker, of such theorists venturing forth five hundred miles from tide-water to the gold-bearing creeks of Cariboo fighting their way through raging torrents, over precipitous mountains, skirting hostile Indian bands, exposed to hunger, to heat, and to cold; toiling long hours on the gravel bars of distant creeks, and dying lone deaths far from friends. They had faith in themselves, as individuals, and were inspired by the unquenchable fire of ambition and adventure.

It is true that our social theorists talk learnedly of creating a new social order. These men talked little, but told much, and built through their efforts a great and enduring monument in the Cariboo, which now contributes so much to the welfare of all of us in British Columbia.

Cariboo is a busy country, with less direct relief, I think I am safe in saying, than any ridink in the province. Relief is what keeps the budget unbalanced, but it does not come from Cariboo, and it is unfair that Cariboo should be penalized.

Taxes

Cariboo contributes richly to the provincial exchequer out of all proportion to its population, through land taxes, grazing taxes, mining taxes, income taxes, hunting and fishing taxes, business taxes, and other taxes. It is appreciated that a great sronortion of the taxes go to pay for the wonderful system of social legislation and educational facilities which the last Liberal Governments have so splendidly developed; but the people of Cariboo share very little in such outlays. Because of very widely scattered population, pioneering on the fringe of the frontier, Cariboo has no great technical schools, junior high schools housed in magnificent buildings, with shops and gymnasiums, and partly endowed with provincial funds. The backbone of our educational system is still the lonely log school house—although we've just built a splendid frame schoolhouse in Kuesnel with much appreciated assistance from the Minister of Education.

As far as social legislation is concerned, we share even less; for reus-

ons we are proud of. The indomitable self reliance of the pioneer who created Cariboo persists in the present generation of Cariboo people, and they are loath to depend upon Government paternalism. It is only fair to say, however, that in Cariboo people have opportunities to make their own way which are denied equally independent people in cities or less bountifully endowed portions of the province.

We do have a few unfortunates and helpless, but invariably the generous spirit of Cariboo communities has taken care of them. The fact remains that in these fields asks for and gets far less than its proportionate share, so naturally expects more when it comes to the greatest of all Cariboo problems, the crying need of all portions of the Cariboo—roads.

Mr. Speaker, in conclusion I would say that this Government is under a moral and historic obligation to Cariboo. It was Cariboo gold that created this province of British Columbia. It was Cariboo gold that gave the country value in the eyes of the East. It was Cariboo gold that led to Confederation and the building of the Canadian Pacific Ry. This northward looking century, like our Premier, a premier who has given three forward exhibitions of statesmanship this year alone: the New Westminster bridge, which is not only a distinct provincial asset, but is also an important link in the trans-Canada highway and (2) entertained the Governor-General Tweedsmuir Park, a natural game sanctuary of 5000 square miles. And I might say in passing that the benefits that might accrue to this province as a result of that visit cannot be estimated in dollars and cents. An account of their trip through the Park, written by Lady Tweedsmuir, will shortly appear in the National Geographic, which has a subscription list of four hundred thousand, and is read by about two million people. Probably ten million people have listened in radio talks about Tweedsmuir Park. Stories of their Excellencies' trip have already appeared in American, British, Australian, New Zealand and South African papers.

The third is the suggested taking over of the Yukon and the envisioning of the western blivark on the Pacific under a single administration . . . an administration that understands the West, a West not always understood at Ottawa, which invariably looks at things from a purely Eastern viewpoint.

It is the North which gives Canada its distinctive character, that is not possessed by any other country in this hemisphere, and which may eventually determine the ultimate character and future of Canada, and the course of this province. All this is worthy of more than passing attention by this House here and now.
