Cino-Japanese War Unites All of Empire

The Cino-Japanese undeclared war entered its second year today and the Chinese people observe this anniversary by paying tribute to those who have sacrificed their lives for the defence of their country. It is also the anniversary of the first year of successful resistance, although casualties during the twelve months of fighting exceed the million mark. But the most significant thing is that China has unified one hundred per cent since hostilities started last summer, under the leadership of General Chiang Kai Shek, and the determination of the Chinese people to resist the Japanese and fight to the very last under a unified China.

At present the people still are ignorant as to the significance and the direct cause of the present conflict. Therefore the following article will furnish the necessary answers.

SINO-JAPANESE WAR ONE YEAR OLD

The Japanese have a dubious distinction in the art of "incident" creation. If they do not excel in the technique they certainly are unparalleled in the numerous "incidents" they have created in China recently. Once "incidents" are created the Japanese do not hesitate to avail themselves of the opportunities thus open to them. Incident upon incident has been used as pretext to launch their acts of aggression, which constitute a grave challenge to the standards of humanity and international law.

About two years ago a Japanese vice counsel at Nanking disappeared. The matter was immediately called to the attention of the Chinese authorities. No effort was spared to locate the missing man. The Japanese were afraid that he might have been murdered and days passed, but still there was no trace of the missing counsel. Japan threatened action. Finally the counsel who had caused all the turmoil turned up in a Chinese tea house in a suburb of Nanking. He had gone to the Ming tomb in the suburb to commit suicide, for some unknown reason. Evidently he changed his mind when he arrived at his chosen place of death. After hiding there for a few days hunger drove him to the tea house, where he was immediately recognized.

Similarly, a Japanese marine was found to be missing in Shanghai last summer. The municipal authorities were immediately notified. While the search was on Japan lodged a protest with the intimation that the marine had been murdered by the Chinese. However, he was found safe and sound. He had only visited the "forbidden" district and was afraid to face the penalty. He was found masquerading in the disguise of a Chinese coolie.

MARCO POLO BRIDGE INCIDENT CAUSES WAR

Then a year ago today, the Luk-kuochiao, or Marco Polo Bridge Incident, which was the direct cause of the Cino-Japanese undeclared war, which is still raging, occurred.

On the night of July 7, 1937, Japanese troops were holding illegal night manoeuvres in the neighborhood of the Marco Polo Bridge, where they had no right whatever to station troops, and they used Wanping, a nearby town, as an objective of attack. The Japanese claimed that one of their number was missing at roll call, and demanded a search after midnight of the Chinese garrison at Wanping by a sizable squad of Japanese soldiers. The Chinese garrison would not submit to the search whereupon the Japanese opened fire, trying to force an entrance, and the Chinese returned the fire.

Suffice it to say "incident" creation invariably starts with a missing person, in some instances a fictitious person. That person is supposed to have been killed or murdered. It follows that strong action on the part of a friendly nation calls for strong protest. Impossible demands follow, backed by the huge Japanese war machine. Unless China capitulates Japan strikes. Japan did strike -- Japan is still striking.

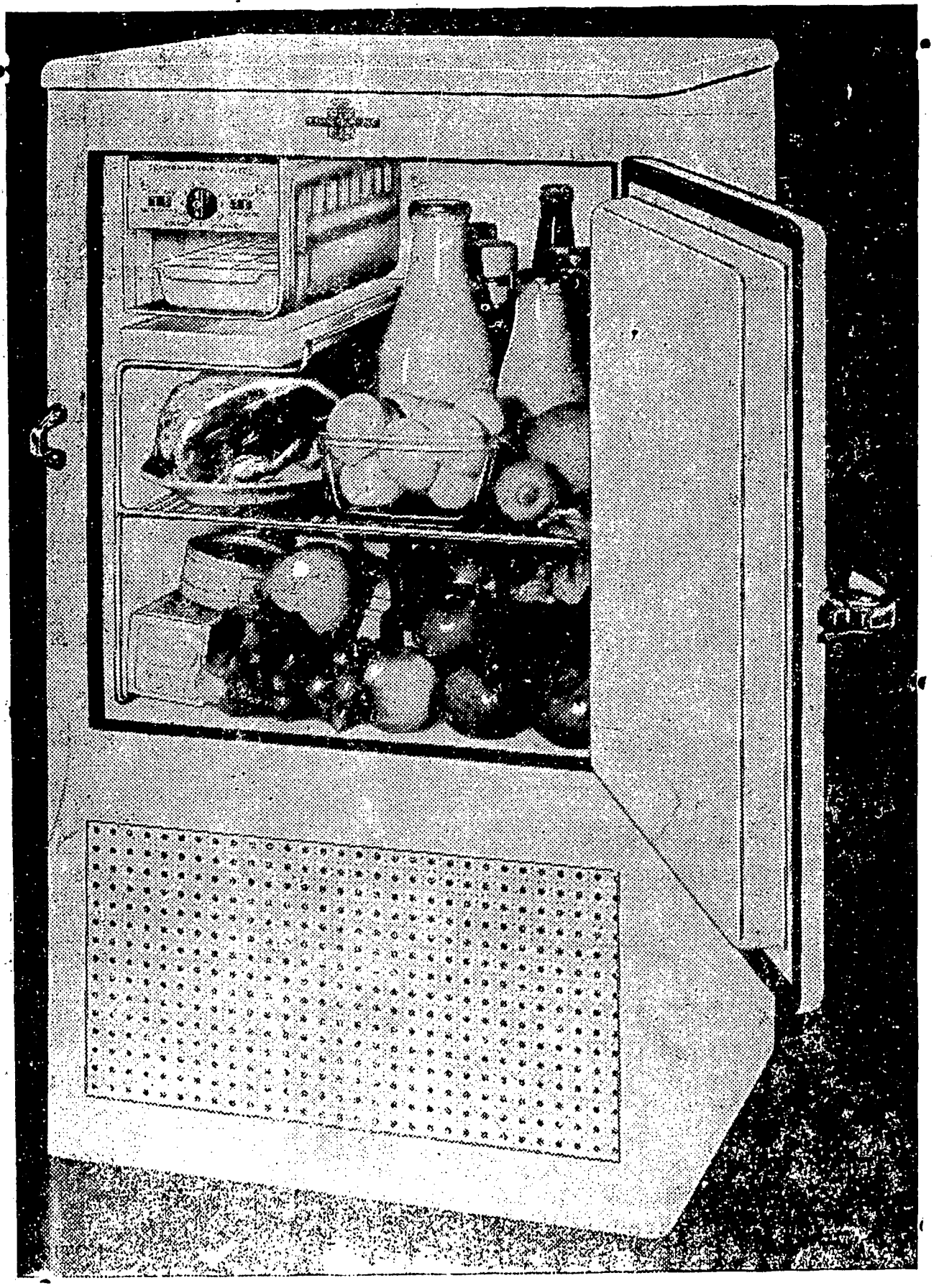

propriations in the southern part of the Province. It was pointed out, however, that the northern portions of the Province did not fight hard enough for improvements to their roads. The matter will be brought to the attention of the Government. G. E. Malcolm moved that The News-Herald be communicated with, promising a full report of the resolutions regarding roads passed at the annual meeting of the Associated Boards. A committee was appointed to arrange for the entertainment of Gen. Hornby and party, who will be here in mid-August. Gen. Hornby is the sponsor of an Empire immigration scheme, by which means it is planned to place British settlers on the land in Western Canada. He is on a tour of Cariboo with that idea in mind. The standing immigration committee of the Board of Trade, Louis LeBourdais and D. F. McNeill, with the addition of J. Holt, M. H. Ramsay and W. Henning, form the special committee.

The repair of the Quesnel-Likely road was then brought up. This road is about 53 miles in length, and would provide a water grade all the way to Likely. It would take very little money to complete it. At present there are over 200 persons living along the route, besides the people at the Likely end. Some of the finest farm land in the district, and much mining ground lies along the route. The matter will be brought to the attention of the member.

It was moved and seconded that the August meeting of the Board be left to the call of the chair. The meeting adjourned at 2:30 p.m.
