

**THE HOUSEWIFE**  
Jellied Tomato Cheese Salad  
2 tablespoons granulated gelatin  
1/2 cup cold water  
1 cup tomato juice  
1 1/2 cups cream or cottage cheese  
1 cup salad dressing  
1 cup chopped celery  
1/4 cup chopped green pepper  
1 tablespoon minced onion  
Salt and pepper to season  
Soak gelatin in cold water. Heat to melt in hot water. Dissolve gelatin in hot juice. Add cheese and heat until thoroughly blended. Cool. When mixture is partially thickened add salad dressing, celery, green pepper, onion and seasonings. Pour into a mould until firm.

**Cheese-Vegetable Salad**  
1 tablespoon gelatin  
3 tablespoons cold water  
1 1/2 cups cream or cottage cheese  
1/2 cup mayonnaise  
Juice of 1/2 lemon  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 cup grated carrot  
1 green pepper, chopped  
1 small onion, minced  
1 medium cucumber, seeded and diced  
Salt to taste  
Soak gelatin in cold water. Dissolve over hot water. Mix all ingredients. Stir in dissolved gelatin. Mould and chill.

**Lettuce Rolls**  
1 head lettuce  
1 1/2 cups cottage cheese  
3/4 cup seedless raisins  
3/4 cup chopped nuts  
Salt, pepper and paprika  
Wash and dry lettuce leaves well. Combine other ingredients. Spread mixture on leaves. Roll up like jelly rolls. Tie with pimento strips. Serve two or three rolls on each salad plate.

**Cheese-Pineapple Salad**  
1 1/2 cups cottage or cream cheese  
1/2 cup mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing  
1/2 cup drained, crushed pineapple  
1-3 cup finely chopped pimento  
1-3 cup finely chopped celery  
1-3 cup chopped, browned almonds  
Salt  
Mayonnaise or cooked salad dressing  
Toss ingredients together lightly, using two forks. Add salt to taste. Serve with additional mayonnaise or salad dressing.

**Blueberry Pancakes**  
4 tablespoons sugar  
1 cup blueberries  
1 1/2 cups scalded milk  
1/2 cup fine stale bread crumbs  
2 tablespoons shortening  
2 eggs well beaten  
1/2 cup flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
Add sugar to blueberries and let stand 15 to 20 minutes. Add milk to crumbs and shortening and soak until crumbs are soft. Add eggs, then flour, salt and baking powder which have been mixed and sifted together. Stir in sweetened blueberries. Heat griddle or frying pan thoroughly. grease lightly and cook pancakes first on one side, then on the other. Serve as a dessert, sprinkled with powdered sugar or with butter and syrup.

**Old-Fashioned Blueberry Muffins**  
1-3 cup of butter  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 egg  
2 cups flour (sifted)  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup milk—or a little less  
3/4 cup blueberries, washed and well drained  
Cream butter and gradually add sugar and egg. Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add dry ingredients alternately with the milk. Add blueberries and mix carefully. Fill well-greased muffin tins two-thirds full and bake in a hot oven (400F.) for 20-25 minutes.

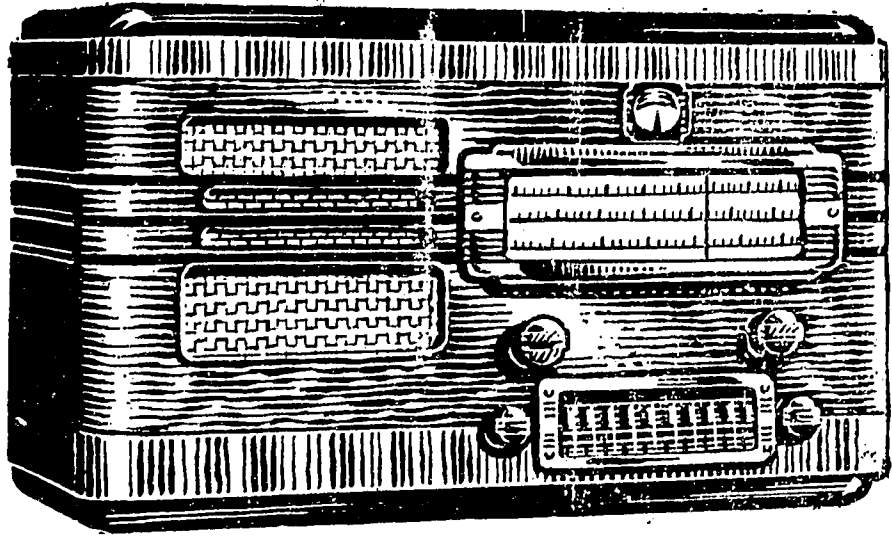

**Editor Mitchell Shows  
B. C. Mining Pictures**

Province's Mineral Wealth  
Described During Two-  
Hour Entertainment

Howard T. Mitchell, editor of The Financial News, Vancouver, and also chairman of the Vancouver Board of Trade's mining bureau, treated a number of Quesnel residents to a two-hour movie of British Columbia's mining industry Friday night.

The picture, which was photographed by Editor Mitchell during his travels to the various mining camps in the Province during the past two years, was made with the idea of showing the people in the cities how British Columbia's No. 1 industry operated, and of what tremendous importance it was to the farmer, manufacturer and others. The picture was, however, probably of more interest to those in the mining areas.

Showing of the film here was scheduled for Thursday night in the Legion Hall, and publicity was posted to this effect. Late Thursday afternoon a wire was received from Mr. Mitchell stating that he would be unable to appear here that night. He had punched a hole in the oil pan of his car on the new, and yet unfinished, Cariboo-Hudson road. For that reason very few people were aware he was showing the picture in the Cariboo Hotel sample room last night.

The film covered all mining areas in British Columbia, with photographs of the principal mines in each district. Of particular interest was a film of the new Zeballos camp. Mr. Mitchell had made pictures of the camp at its commencement of mining activity there two years ago, and in November last took additional shots. The progress the camp made in the short time intervening was amazing.

During the showing of the film, Mr. Mitchell explained each phase as it was shown on the screen. One interesting feature was the two different methods of treating gold-bearing ore. One, taken at the Cariboo Gold Quartz mine, showed the cyanide process, and another, taken at Bralorne, the flotation method of extraction. These processes were shown from the time the ore was mined in the stopes to the pouring of the gold brick.

Mr. Mitchell is to be congratulated for the carrying out of his self-imposed task of making British Columbia's residents conscious of the great natural wealth they have in their mining industry, and he is making a fine job of it.

**HUDSON TO DRIVE SHASTA

mediate future is of my own plan and advice.

"Mr. McDonald is working in perfect harmony with this deep level programme and I am sure he feels the same confidence that we all do of ore in the deeper levels."

In summarizing work to date Mr. Wells repeats his reports of May 3, 1937, telling of the first important strike; of Jan. 5, 1938, telling of development of ore on the Shasta belt and his recommendation of a 100-ton mill; of Jan. 21, 1938, telling of the cutting of the first orebody on the 50 foot level and the ordering of heavy machinery. Mr. Wells brings the account up to date in the current report. He states that after the Shasta crosscut was completed and the ore extended in the shaft, a complete new programme of development was decided on—the plan being to extend the Shasta crosscut through the hill to the Harvey Creek slope, drop down on surface to a level 400 feet below the compressor level.

Since his January report Mr. Wells adds:

"The power plant has been installed, including a 120-h.p. diesel engine and Ingersoll-Rand Angle Compound Compressor of 500 cubic feet capacity. The milling plant, consisting of a 100-ton cyanide plant, complete with filter and over-size rock breaker and crusher (with the exception of the power plant of two 150-h.p. engines now on the way) had all been delivered to the mine before the snow road broke up this spring.

Lumber necessary for mill buildings, new bunk house and large warehouse, in all, several hundred tons of freight, have gone to the camp.

"All freight has been handled with a 40-diesel cat, owned by the McKinnon Freight Lines of Barkerville.

"Details of the milling plant and

mill construction will be given at the meeting by Russel J. Spry.

**Claims Crown Granted**

Dr. W. B. Burnett, president, in introducing the company's first annual report, covering operations from incorporation, Nov. 19, 1936, to March 31, 1938, advises that nine claims have been crown granted and application made for crown grants covering the remaining 14 claims. J. M. McDonald, M.E., who was given complete charge of operations in March will make an informal report of conditions to date at the annual meeting.

Referring to the account of early development given by Mr. Wells, the president comments:

"I believe it only fair to state that the early demonstration of a valuable orebody was not a lucky accident but the result of many years of careful study and correct interpretation of much surface and shallow workings. His intimate knowledge of the local geology will continue to be of great value to the company in his new position of 'Director in Charge of Development'."

At the meeting shareholders will be asked to approve a resolution to confirm and continue an arrangement whereby directors co-operate closely with Miller Lougheed, fiscal agent, in raising funds. The resolution covers certain remuneration and expenses paid by Mr. Lougheed to directors for their assistance to him in selling treasury shares. The president points out that the close acquaintanceship between investors and management is bound to result in a much more stable price for the stock than where purchase has been made with the idea of profit from a market turnover.
