Minister of Mines Says Industry To Make New Record in 1938

Prevailing Low Base Metal Prices Will Reduce Value of Production, Although Volume Greatest in Province's History

Nineteen thirty-seven was a banner year for the mining industry of British Columbia, with record production in both volume and value. During the current year volume for the first six months, with the exception of coal, exceeded that of 1937 in all branches of the industry, but due to low base metal prices, there has been a considerable decrease in the value of production, however, the benefit to the province of the number of men employed and the purchase of supplies and materials will compare favorably with last year. Gold production continues to increase and with a better diversification of mine output the industry is each year getting into a sounder position.

The Provincial Department of Mines, through its various branches, is lending every assistance within its means to the development of the mining industry in the province. Co-operating with the Federal Department of Mines and Resources, we are pressing for more and more geological mapping in the province, with the object of obtaining a definite understanding with the Dominion authorities that not less than ten geological parties should be maintained in this province each year.

Our own technical staff which is second to no other provincial organization, is making detailed examinations of prospects and small properties. It is not the function of our technical staff to examine mining properties where there is a competent technical management.

The provincial laboratories are well equipped and are handling more work than at any time in the past. A certain amount of free assaying is done for the bona fide prospector, and microscopic work is done on both ores and concentrates.

A great deal of work is being done on the industrial minerals and in about a year's time a survey will have been completed of all known occurrences.

The Department has provided during the past two years a service to the small placer miner through the purchase of quantities of gold too small to ship to the Dominion Assay Office. During the last two years over 3000 lots with an aggregate value of over \$100,000 have been purchased, with a net return to the small placer miners of some \$20,000 more than they would have obtained by selling to private organizations. The only cost to the Government has been the one per cent handling charge of the Royal Canadian Mint, and additional work for various members of the staff.

The sampling plant, established last year at Prince Rupert, as an experiment to stimulate activity among prospectors along the line of the Canadian National Railways to Prince Rupert, is beginning to show results, and if only one mine is brought into production within the next few years as a result of this effort, it will have been well justified.

The Department for a number of years has conducted lectures in geology and prospecting at various centres throughout the province. It has also maintained placer mining training camps in which a number of young men have been given a thorough training in placer mining methods, and also in preparing them to take care of themselves in the outdoors. In addition, it has trained the young men to work together, and in most cases it is the first time the trainees have actually done any work of an organized character.

The Department, co-operating with the Federal Department of Mines and Resources, has during the past three years planned extensive mining road and trail projects which are carried out by the Provincial Department of Public Works. This is in addition to the small grant made each year by the Department for mining roads and trails, which in the aggregate over the last 20 years, has amounted to some \$2,000,000. This work is being gradually systemized with the definite object in view of opening up new country.

Mining is a wasting asset, and the chief objective of the Department of Mines is to bend its efforts toward the development of new properties and new areas, so that the mining industry will continue as one of the chief basic industries of this province.

The Minister of Mines extends his hearty congratulations to the B.C. Chamber of Mines, under the direction of Mr. Frank W. Woodside, for the excellent display of British Columbia minerals at the Vancouver Exhibition.—W. J. Asselstine.

PREM. PATTULLO WILL GO TO OTTAWA TO DISCUSS PLANS FOR BRITISH IMMIGRATION

Premier Pattullo will go to Ottawa this fall to attend the sittings of the Rowell Commission, when he will introduce the plans of British sponsors for the settlement of 10,000 British

settlers in Western Canada, principally in B.C. During the recent visit through this part of the interior the British delegation expressed themselves as being pleased with the type of country they were shown. Premier Pattullo has long advocated such a scheme for British Columbia.

CANADA SETS NEW RECORD IN GOLD OUTPUT

Canadian gold mines yielded 390,693 ounces during June to surpass all previous monthly records, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported recently. Output in the previous month was 381,089 ounces, and in June 1937, 344,895 ounces.

Output from Ontario mines amounted to 231,512 ounces during the month under review. Of that total 101,709 ounces came from the Porcupine camp, 88,075 from the Kirkland Lake area and 47,748 from other sources.

Quebec operators reported a production of 64,413 ounces, British Columbia 54,176, Manitoba and Saskatchewan 20,985, Yukon 11,014, and Nova Scotia 2588.

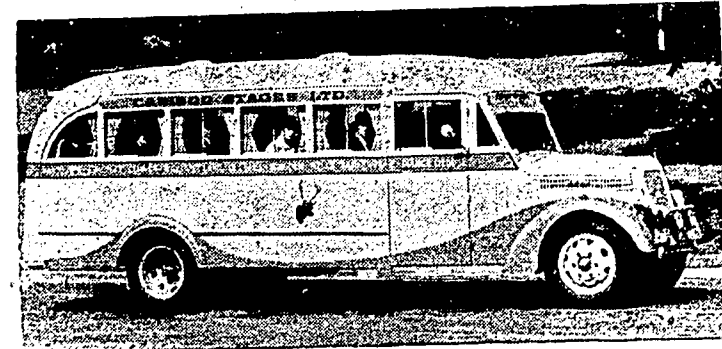

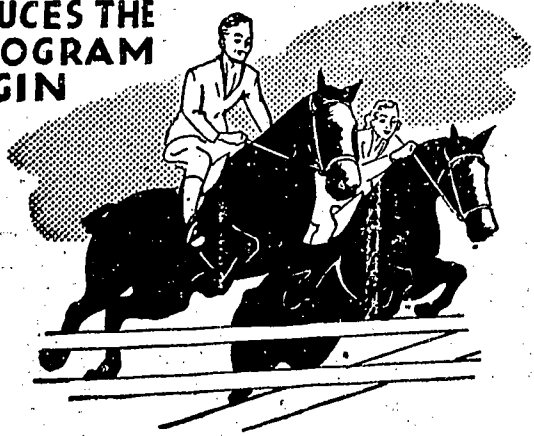
