Minister Outlines Important Amendments to Mineral Act

Changes Will Be Made In Assessment Work Filing and Laws Governing Claim Staking

Plans by the Mines Department to amend certain clauses in the existing Mines Act, which were given a year's hoist at the last session of the Provincial Legislature when they met with strenuous objection from the mining men of the Province, will be again introduced to the Legislature during the coming session, according to word from Mines Department officials.

The amendments, which have been prepared under the direction of W. J. Asselstine, Minister of Mines, were not thoroughly understood by the mining men last year, and their real meaning was misconstrued, it is asserted. It was unfortunate that the scheduled changes could not have been explained to the mining fraternity before the session convened last fall.

This year, however, Mr. Asselstine has made a thorough tour of the mining areas in the Province, and has explained what the proposed changes will embrace, and what conditions under the present Act they will correct.

Assessment Work And Crown Grants

One of the major changes which will be made is that regarding the security of title in the development company, when swearing to assessors of a prospect. Formerly an owner or company man swearing to assessors for the purpose of obtaining a Crown Grant, were able to do so on one claim only in a group of eight. It will be necessary, providing the amendment goes through, to swear to assessors on all eight claims.

When an owner or company, holder, mineral claims, makes a false declaration in regard to assessment work, as has been done frequently in various mining areas of the Province in the past, the Minister will be given the power to order an investigation within a year of the filing of such assessment claim, and will have the power, providing the assessment declaration has been proved false, of declaring the ground in question open for staking.

"Blanketing" to Be Made Impossible

Under the existing Mining Act the holder of a free miner's licence can stake one claim for himself on any one lode, and as many others as he holds proxies for in other names. The new amendment will provide that he can stake six claims for himself, but only three for other persons, within a radius of ten miles. This particular amendment is almost certain to be held in strong disfavor by the prospector.

The old provision of "rock in place" is to be abandoned, and a prospector in future may stake on any ground. This, naturally, will do away with the old necessity of a discovery post.

Troublesome Fractions Will Be Eliminated

A full claim is to remain the same size as heretofore, 1500 by 1500 ft., but where a claim is found, upon being surveyed, to be overstaked, no fraction will be left open, as the owner of the full claim will be allowed to stake it upon payment of a penalty. With the adoption of this latter amendment will go one of the most prolific sources of legal battling in the mineral game.

The new amendments, according to Mr. Asselstine, have been designed as much to allow early development of lode ground in B.C. as to remove snags in the Mining Act which have bothered the Department for a number of years, and will, it is hoped, hasten orderly lode mining expansion in B.C.

Quesnelle Quartz Mill Completed by Sept. 30

Truck loads of material for the new mill at Quesnelle Quartz mine, near Hixon Creek, have been passing through town for the past three weeks, and it is expected that the mill will be turning over by the end of September.

Exploration of the property by the present management has been vigorously pushed, and during the work a formation of what is tentatively classified as limestone replacement ore was struck, although different from that encountered in the Island Mountain workings. The Quesnelle Quartz ore carries a much finer sulphite than that of the Wells mine. This ore is so well disseminated in the country rock that it is difficult to follow and sample, but carries excellent values.

The first unit of the mill is essentially for sampling purposes, and the ore on the various levels will be given mill runs to test its possibilities. Although openings have been made at the 50, 100, 150, 200, 300 and 400 ft. levels, the bulk of the work has

been done on the 50, 200 and 400 ft. levels. While the new mill will only operate at a 25 ton per day capacity during the sampling period, accommodation has been allowed for in the mill and power house buildings for an additional unit of the same size, which will be installed when the sampling has been completed.

FARM JOTTINGS

TENDING THE GARDENS IN AUTUMN TIME

Gardens everywhere are now at the most alluring stage, and provide opportunity for the enthusiastic amateurs to observe what new varieties combinations, contrasts and cultural methods may best serve to enhance the loveliness of their own creative efforts, says G. R. Snyder, Soils Chemist.

New conceptions can be put into practice at once, for the late summer and early fall is an excellent time for the establishment or improvement of lawns and perennial borders, and the setting out of the everpopular pansy, forget-me-not and English daisy.

For fall planting, however, great care is required in the preparation of the soil. Early, vigorous growth is essential if the plants are to become well established before the cold weather sets in. Plant food of a character that will promote both vegetative and strong root growth is required in abundance and in readily available form.

Lawn improvements begin with the elimination of weeds. Dandelions

can be discouraged by treating the individual plants with a shot of chemical weed killer. Weeds flourish when the turf is thin, and can be best controlled by maintaining a thick grass sward through the practice of early fall seeding of the bare spots and early fall seeding of the entire lawn.

When making plans for fall planting, the preparation of mulching material for the lawn should not be overlooked. Well rotted manure and good loam soil built up in layers of a few inches in thickness and well watered should be ready for use before the cold weather sets in.

Gardens that provide beauty, interest and pleasure every day are not the product of chance, but rather the result of an accumulation of ideas developed by intelligent co-operation with nature and science.

Violet, bright red, wine reds, terra cotta, cocoa deep blue and greens are the new shades for the coming season.

British Delegates Are Pleased With Cariboo

Following the trip though this portion of the district by Sir Henry Page Croft and R. Stanley Dalgleish, representatives of the British Government surveying the possibilities of settling 10,000 British on the land, the representatives met with Premier Pattullo and his cabinet, and the talks resulted in the unqualified approval of the scheme by B.C. The next step will be the approval by Ottawa of the setting aside of large tracts of Crown land which will be turned over for settlement purposes.

Sir Henry explained to the B.C. Government representatives, as he did at the various meetings held between Kamloops on the south and Prince George on the north, that the scheme (with the exception of the donation of lands to the settlers) would be financed by the British Government. The settlers will be taken care of until such time as they become adapted to Canadian conditions, and will be systematically trained in Canadian farming methods. If, as will probably happen in some cases, the settler cannot adapt himself to Canadian conditions, he will be taken back to the homeland at the expense of the British Government. They will not, in any case, become a charge upon the Canadian Government.

The British representatives were tremendously impressed by what they had been shown in the interior of B.C., and expressed themselves as being confident that the plan would be successful, and that the full quota of 10,000 settlers could be placed with ease in the districts they visited. They said further that they could return to Britain with the object of their visit accomplished in a most satisfactory manner, and were grateful to the various B.C. organizations which had showed them about the country.

Cariboo, with its great natural resources and unlimited opportunities should prove the ideal setting for this ambitious settlement plan.
