FARM JOTTINGS

THE VALUE OF GRASS IN FARMING ECONOMY

Farming today offers a great variety of interest and opportunities to those who prefer the outdoor life. True, the problems confronting the farmer are more perplexing than in the past, when soils were more fertile and the insect and fungus pests were almost unknown. Yet, today, both the art and science of agriculture have advanced to the point where a higher standard of farming is possible, says Mr. G. R. Snyder, well-known soil chemist.

One of the most interesting and important developments of recent years is the realization that grass, the commonest and most neglected farm crop, is in reality the farm's and nation's most valuable asset. The saying, "Aw, go to grass," carried no special significance until the scientists discovered that grass, due to its high mineral and vitamin content, contains special nutritional properties, valuable alike to man and beast.

Practical livestock men have long known that cattle prefer and thrive better on grass produced on soils of certain types than on others, but the exact reason was unknown. However, through chemistry, man has been able to discover many of nature's secrets, and we now know that the special properties referred to, as well as the protein and carbohydrate content of grass, depend largely upon the degree of fertility present in the soil on which it is grown.

Unfortunately, the former false concept that the fertility of pastures could be maintained through the droppings of the grazing livestock has resulted in the rapid depletion of the mineral plant food substances in the soils of many areas once famous for the quality of beef and milk produced. As the level of fertility declines the clovers and domestic grasses are quickly displaced by dandelions, mosses, blue, wire grass and other species of poverty plants. These are warning signals which should be heeded.

With the awakened appreciation of the value of grass, pasture improvement studies have become major projects in every province of the Dominion. Exceedingly profitable results from the application of chemical fertilizers have been demonstrated and the economy of the practice confirmed on many a farm where the stock carrying capacity of the pasture has been more than doubled.

Some farmers with light soils, low in nitrogen, have shown a preference for the spring application of complete fertilizers of 2-12-6 or 4-12-6 analysis, but in the better pasture areas, and especially where clover is present in the herbage, fall applications of high phosphate-potash fertilizer of the type of 0-16-6 is the more approved practice. The addition of these minerals promotes vigorous rooting, thus fortifying the herbage against drought and winter-killing and definitely encouraging the growth of wild white clover.

Grazing pastures to the point of depletion of plant food in the soil is an unsound practice, dating back to the days of unlimited areas of virgin land, and has no place in the production of our modern high quality farm products, and maintenance of our improved livestock.

Well over 100 men are employed at the Cariboo-Hudson mine at the present time and work is being pushed forward as rapidly as possible in order to have the mill and power house buildings completed before snow flies. According to word from the mine and hauling of gravel for building and machinery foundations was completed Thursday. This was a large task as the gravel had to be hauled from the site of the old Antler Creek dredge, eight miles from the Hudson property. Gravel in the vicinity of the mine contained too much talc and slate.
 Foundations have been completed for the mill building and the roof will be in place inside of a week. O. H. Solbakke, fiscal agent for the company, passed through here Thursday en route for the mine.

Private Ownership Canada's Best Move

Dealing with the situation in Canada Mr. Irvine gave as the major cause of Canada's plight the private ownership of what should properly belong to the public. The wealth of Canada lies in the hands of about a dozen private individuals and companies. He gave as an illustration the power holdings of Sir Herbert Holt on the St. Lawrence. "If anything in Canada should belong to the people, he said, 'surely it should be the rivers.' We all pay toll to Sir Herbert when a pair of pants, shoes or machinery is manufactured. The manufacturing company must use Sir Herbert's power, and the charge is passed along to the consumer. He likened the economic picture in Canada to a cream separator. The money, like the milk, is poured in at the top. The farmers and wage earners sit under the skim milk spout, and the wealthy private individuals and trusts under the cream spout.
 In conclusion the speaker said that Canada would eventually have to take over these trusts, and certain industries. Banking and insurance companies were mentioned specifically.

Those who turned out to hear Mr. Irvine were very glad they had done so, and while many do not agree with him in all he said, he left a very thoughtful audience at the conclusion of his speech, and one upon which the realization that Canada's economic and political set-up is not all that it might be, is firmly impressed.
