Canadian Repats Get Extra Rations

Canada's army personnel who have been repatriated from Japanese prison camps in the Far East will receive extra food rations for three months to enable them to regain their health after the rigors of imprisonment, announces Howard I. Ross, administrator of Consumer Rationing, Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

On their arrival at their military depots they are being supplied with extra food ration coupons to offset the long months of malnutrition they have endured.

The extra rations are being provided by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board at the request of the Director of Medical Services, Department of National Defence, Mr. Ross explained.

Extra rations are also available for servicemen already repatriated from the Pacific theatre. These may be secured with proof of prisoner-of-war status at any branch of the Ration Administration.

"Civilian internees, returning from the Far East, are also entitled to special rations if there is a medical need for additional sugar, butter, meat and other rationed foods," Mr. Ross concluded.

All Owners are required to register with the Board. Those persons not registered may obtain the necessary forms by writing to the Secretary, B.C. Interior Vegetable Marketing Board, Kelowna, B.C.

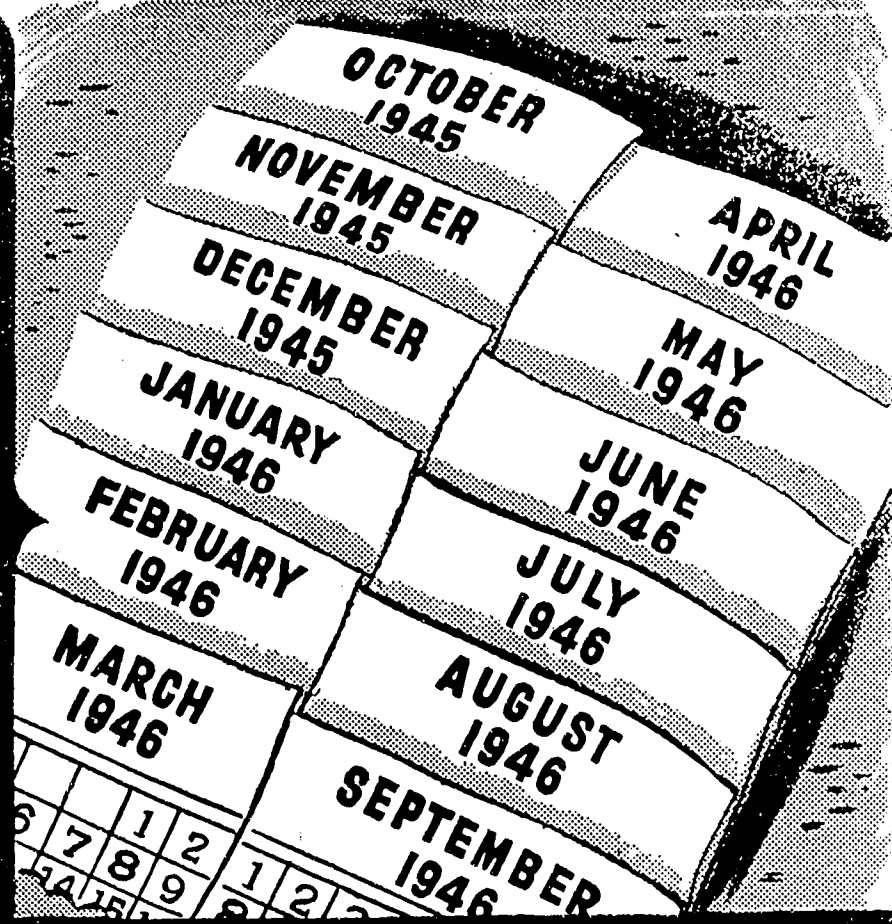

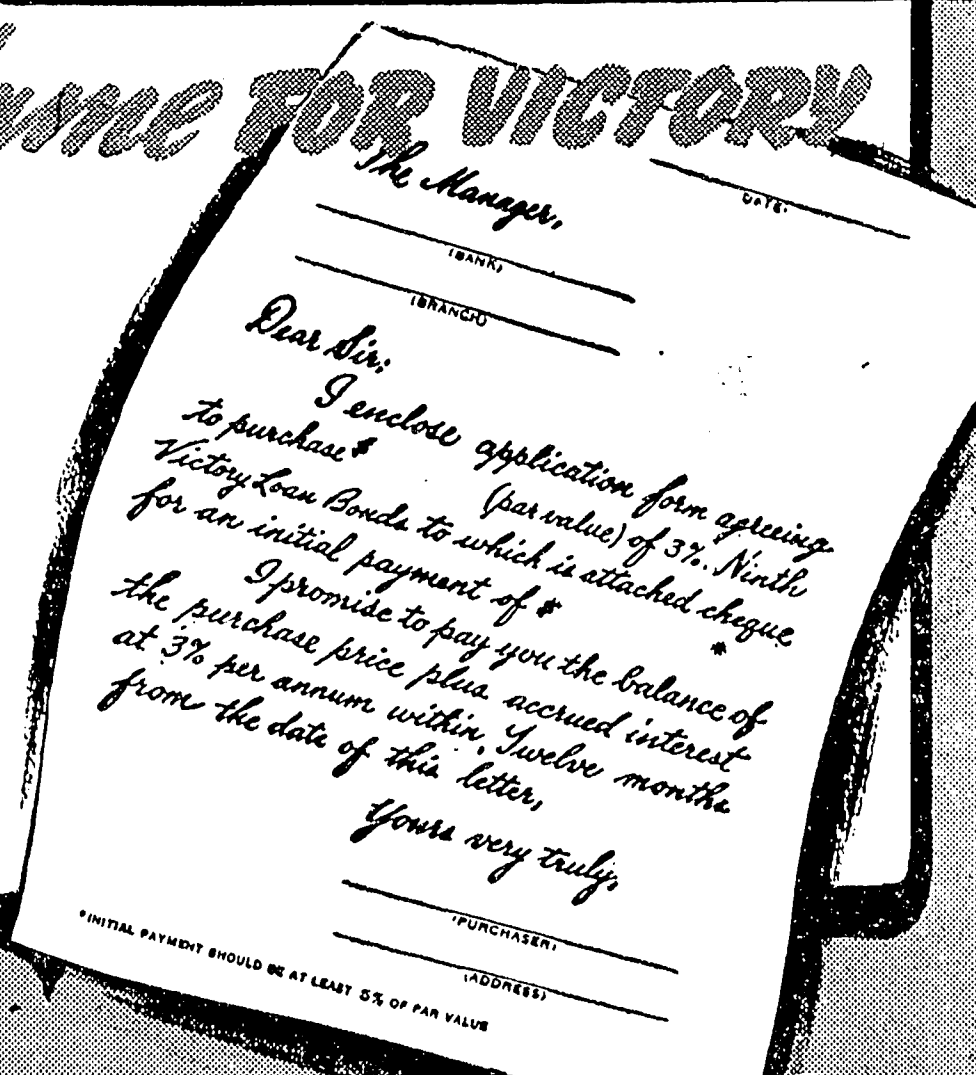

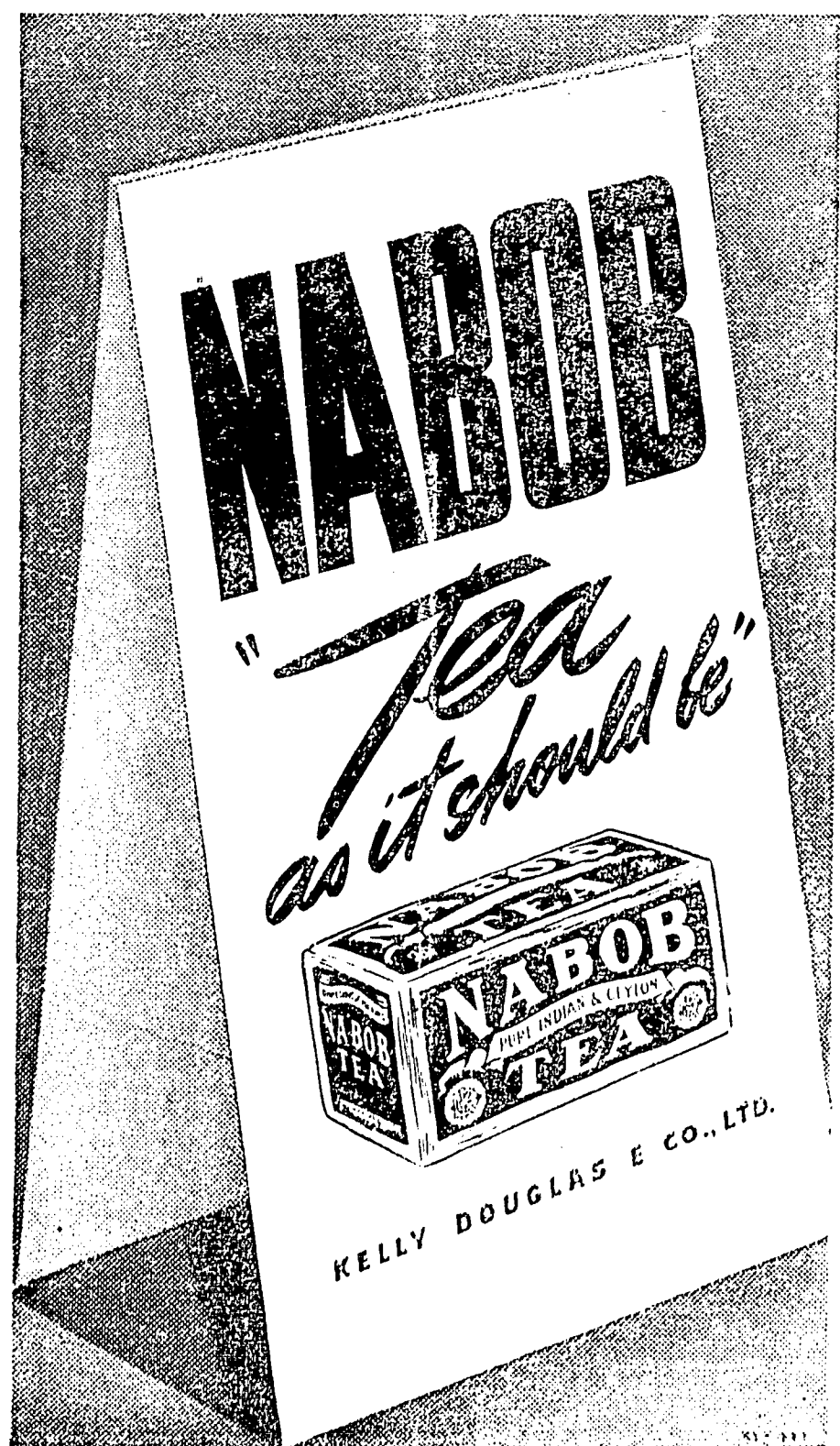

**SURVEYING
In British Columbia**



BEFORE any kind of development can take place—be it road construction, house building, farming, lumbering, shipping or airways—the location of points and areas with relation to the world and each other is essential. Each city lot must be accurately located so that there is no encroachment on other lots or on the street. Roads must be laid out accurately to service town or country; each farmer must know the limits of his property; the lumberman his timber limit; the vessel or aircraft is only safe as long as its position is known accurately with relation to the land.

This knowledge is attained through surveying, the science of locating the geographical position of points, and of tying them together into the pattern of the country. From this evolves the measurement of distances, horizontally or vertically, and of areas. The result is a map or plan.

Maps, like houses, are built up from a foundation to the finished job. The foundation of all maps is the accurate location of a number of points on the earth's surface determined by observation on the fixed stars. From these points the foundation is carried over the country by measurements of various kinds, including aerial photographs. The use of vertical photographs taken from the air was highly developed and refined during the recent war.

British Columbia has been a leader in using this form of surveying and has developed unique methods of combining air photographs with others taken on the ground to secure an accurate delineation of the surface of the Province. Over 60,000 square miles, or one-sixth of the Province, have been so mapped.

There are over 125,000 aerial photographs on file with the Surveyor General, which are much used by officials and public alike.

The Surveyor General of British Columbia has charge of all surveys and mapping in the Province. A large part of his staff and their time is devoted to the production of maps, of which over 60 have been published. These range from a map of the Province at 16 miles to the inch to detailed plans of small lots.

Probably the most useful maps are the one mile to the inch topographical maps, as they show by contour lines the shape of the surface. All may be seen or copies secured from the office of the Surveyor General.
