

Many Forest Fires In Chilcotin District

Forest fires numbering about a dozen, which broke out almost simultaneously in the Chilcotin country, about 60 miles west of Williams Lake, had forestry officials worried for about a week. It was thought for a time that the fires had been set by fur thieves who started the blazes to cover

their illegal operations. Some credence was given this theory by the fact that beaver poachers had been active in that area.

After patrolling the district by air, however, forestry men have discounted the incendiary origin of the fires. It is believed that they started from operations of ranchers burning off wild hay meadows, which is common at this time of year.

The Chilcotin country is abnormally dry at the present time, and

while some of the fires are reported to be "rather large," forestry officials state they are not dangerous. Fires in this kind of country run very fast and do a minimum of damage to growth.

LUMBERING TO THE FORE

Probably due to the large export shipments and shortages in the domestic lumber market, representatives of Coast lumbering concerns are arriving in the district in increasing numbers.

Changes Made In Deer Tag Regulations

A recent issue of the British Columbia Gazette carries an Order-in-Council rescinding the game tag regulations which were imposed in 1937, substituting the following in their place:

1. Each deer, as defined under the Game Act shall, when killed or taken have a seal which has not been previously used attached to the carcass thereof, and such seal must be securely attached to the carcass and locked by the person killing or taking the animal and to whom the seal has been issued in accordance with the provisions of these regulations.

2. Seals may be issued by any game warden, provincial constable, government agent, or any person authorized by the game commission, and the seal shall be in the shape and style as described upon by the game commission, and shall be valid only for the year in which they are issued.

3. A fee of 25 cents shall be payable for every seal.

4. The seal shall remain on the carcass of the deer until deer has been removed or transported to the place where it is proposed to consume the carcass.

5. The transfer of seals by any licence-holder to another is prohibited.

6. These regulations shall not apply in respect to any deer killed by an Indian, prospector, surveyor, or farmer (on his own property only) for use for food pursuant to the provisions in that behalf contained in section 7 to 10, inclusive, of the Game Act.

7. Any person authorized to issue firearms licences and from whom deer seals have been purchased shall note the numbers of the seals so purchased in the space provided for this purpose on the purchaser's firearms licence.

8. Any person found in possession of the carcass of a deer to which a seal has not been securely attached and locked shall be deemed to have committed an offence against these regulations.
