In view of the fact that the Labour Relations Board provided for under British Columbia's new Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act has not yet been appointed, Hon. E. T. Kenney, acting minister of labour, will sit in a judicial capacity to decide questions of fact in connection with the Nanaimo laundry dispute.

Mr. Kenney, who has been acting for several weeks in the absence of Labour Minister Hon. G. S. Pearson, will rule on seven specific points referred to the minister of labour by Nanaimo Magistrate L. Beevor-Polts.

Court hearings of charges against the union, three union officials, and individual strikers at the Imperial Laundry plant will be adjourned until the points raised by the magistrate have been settled by the acting minister.

PRAIRIE CONFERENCE

Further discussions towards extension of the benefits of the Federal Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act to British Columbia dry belts took place in Lethbridge last week between the Federal Minister of Agriculture, Hon. James Gardiner, and British Columbia's Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Frank Putnam, and Minister of Lands and Forests, Hon. E. T. Kenney.

During the conference and in private talks with Mr. Gardiner, the provincial ministers pointed out last year British Columbia grew \$25,000,000 worth of fruit on irrigated land, but insisted that Federal aid was necessary if any further extensions of settlement were to be made.

Only assistance so far granted to this province under the Prairie Farms Rehabilitation Act is in connection with the Pemberton Meadows drainage and reclamation project.

FISHERIES CONFERENCE

George J. Alexander, deputy minister of fisheries, has recently returned from a three-day conference at Ottawa called by Hon. H. G. F. Bridges, Federal Minister of Fisheries, for the purpose of discussing with the industry and the provinces, the setting up of a Fisheries Prices Support Board under the Fisheries Prices Support Act passed by the Dominion Government in 1944.

It is expected that a five-man board will be appointed to set floor prices on certain categories of fish, and Ottawa will announce shortly the names of the personnel to serve on the board. The board will be assisted by advisory committees on each coast in order that it may have the advice of those close to the problems confronting the industry in the different geographical sections of the country.

NEW COURTHOUSE

Tenders have been called on the proposed Alberni courthouse expected to cost approximately \$60,000 it was announced by Hon. E. C. Carson, minister of public works. These tenders must be in the hands of the minister of public works by August 14. Plans call for a two-storey frame building 102 feet in length and an average of 38 feet in width.

Vote for Better Education

For the past several months Quesnel District No. 28 Board of School Trustees has been struggling with the knotty problem presented by shortage of accommodation at the Quesnel School. At the present time the Board is confronted with the almost impossible task of finding temporary quarters for three classrooms. A few years ago this would not have proved so difficult; but today, with every building occupied, and a serious shortage of accommodation existing into the bargain, the task seems hopeless.

Whatever success the Board meets in securing the needed space this year, however, can have little effect on the long-range objectives. It was plainly evident early this year that a new school building would have to be arranged for. The Board of Trustees, after a lot of hard work, has drawn up plans for the new building, and these have been approved by the Department of Education in Victoria. The new school will cost approximately \$300,000.00, with an additional \$36,000.00 for repair and purchase of needed equipment for other schools in the district. Of this amount the ratepayers of School District No. 28 will be called upon to provide \$168,500.00—the remaining \$167,500.00 will be subscribed by the Provincial Government.

On the face of it this appears to be a large amount of money to come from the taxpayers' pockets. However, when details of the loan were worked out it was found that the total amount could be secured and paid off over a period of twenty years with an increase of rate of only three mills. And it is expected that when a reassessment of the district has been carried out that this three-mill rate will be even smaller. Even with an increase of three mills in the taxation rate, Quesnel School District No. 28 will still be one of the more fortunate in British Columbia as far as school taxation is concerned.

A plebiscite for authorization to borrow the amount of \$168,500.00 will be held Saturday, August 9th, from eight o'clock in the morning to eight at night. In the interests of education, and taking into account the serious situation in which the Board of School Trustees finds itself, electors are urged to mark their ballots in favor of giving the Board the necessary power to float this loan.

Co-operation for Victory

Leaders in the continuing struggle to wipe out venereal disease are well aware that without close integration of effort between moral, welfare, health and legal sectors the front as a whole will bog down before reaching its objective — complete victory over VD. Co-operation is the keynote, observes Canada's Health and Welfare, a bulletin issued under authority of the Minister of National Health and Welfare.

This same realization among governmental leaders in the fight has brought about a remarkable degree of co-operation between provincial and federal health departments, through the various divisions of VD control. Each aids the other in furthering the aims of the Four-Sector Front—more particularly, of course, the aims of the health sector.

In the VD field a division of responsibility exists between federal and provincial authorities. The provinces are chiefly concerned with actual treatment, epidemiological investigations and education. The role of the federal government is to provide leadership through co-operative planning of adequate control measures, administration of the Dominion grants-in-aid, performance of activities serving to unite and intensify the country's effort, development of educational media and encouragement of research and improved training facilities for professional personnel.

All provinces offer the same general type of service with slight modifications to suit local conditions. Provision is made for laboratory diagnosis, free treatment and free distribution of drugs to physicians. Reporting of cases is compulsory in each province. Epidemiological investigation of contacts is carried out and case-finding of VD is performed through blood testing and medical examination of special groups. In five provinces special legislation provides for premarital examination for syphilis.

THE LARGEST FLOATING DOCK IN THE WORLD



A dock built by the British in Bombay intended for the use of the Royal Navy in Malta, was recently towed there by Admiralty tugs. It is so large (it can accommodate a 50,000 ton ship) that it had to be cut in two for passage through the Suez Canal. This picture shows the first half of the dock being warped through the El Ferdan swing bridge while a RAF spotter aircraft flies over the top. The second half of the dock can be seen approaching up the Canal in the distance.

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

ANNOUNCEMENT

Rates for Electricity in Quesnel Reduced by the British Columbia Power Commission

The British Columbia Power Commission advises its customers in the Quesnel Power District that reduced rates become effective after the regular June meter reading. The revision conforms to the policy of supplying electrical energy at cost under rate schedules which will encourage the use of modern household appliances, and is made possible at this time by the recently-increased generating capacity of the Quesnel power house. The complete new rate schedules for all classifications of service can be seen by contacting Mr. W. H. Fawcett, District Manager of the Quesnel Power District.

A summary of the more salient features of the new provisions compared with those previously in effect reveals:

1. Abolition of both the 25c meter rental for single phase meters and the 50c monthly rental for three-phase power meters.
2. Reduction in minimum charge for commercial service from \$5.00 net for small establishments.
3. Reduction in service charge for power classification from \$1.00 per H.P. of connected load to \$1.00 per KW of demand.
4. Introduction of Summer Service Schedule available to those who desire service for up to five summer months.

For all service classifications the new schedules place particular emphasis on the maximum rate at which each customer can demand energy rather than merely on the consumption actually recorded. Small customers with a good load factor are thus able to obtain energy for the same unit price as larger consumers with the same load factor.

The minimum demand for residences without electric ranges is 2 kw; where an electric range is installed, the minimum demand will be

3 kw. Under a power contract the minimum demand for motors, etc., is 3 3/4 kw (5 horse power).

Listed below are condensed versions of the new monthly rate schedules and of the seasonal summer schedule as they apply in Rate Zone No. 1. This zone includes the area within the municipal boundaries and such other area as can be served from primaries lying within the municipality.

FOR DEMAND OF 2 KW.
(Applicable to lighting and ordinary appliances)
First 40 kwh. @ 10c per kwh.
Next 120 kwh. @ 2 1/2c per kwh.

Excess kwh. @ 1/2c per kwh.
Minimum \$3.00.

Less discount for prompt payment 10%.

For each kw. increase in demand add 30 kwh. at the first rate and 60 kwh. at the second rate, and add \$1.00 to the minimum monthly charge.

First 200 kwh. @ 3c.
Next 200 kwh. 1 1/2c.
Excess kwh. 1/2c.
Minimum \$4.00.

Next 250 kwh. at 1 1/2c.

For each kw. increase in demand add \$1.00 to the monthly service charge and add 50 kwh. at each of the first and second rates, and add \$1.00 to the minimum bill.

For each kw. increase in demand add \$6.00 to the annual fixed charge, add 50 kwh. for the season at the first rate and 150 kwh. for the season at the second rate, and add \$6.00 to the minimum seasonal charge.

Zone No. 2 includes the areas which can only be served from primaries lying outside the boundaries of the municipality. In this rural territory the monthly minimum bill and the rate per kwh. for the first blocks are slightly higher for some classifications of service. Charges for subsequent blocks are, however, the same in each area, thus encouraging maximum use on the part of all customers, irrespective of location.

Benefits under the new rates to be received by typical residential and commercial consumers in Zone No. 1 are apparent from the following tables:
