## Record Building Year Seen For the Quesnel Area in '62

A comparison of building permits issued in the Quesnel area for the past four years shows a marked increase in construction value for each succeeding year.

Total building volume for 1958 was \$420,768; for 1959, \$717, 865; for 1960, \$1,221,317, and 1961, \$652,610. Some \$300,000 of the 1960 total represented the Billy

Barker Inn, which was subsequently finished in 1961, and \$200,000 of the same total represented the proposed West Quesnel Hotel, which has not been built. Those two adjustments alter the actual building value of 1960 to \$721,317, and 1961 to \$952,610.

### RECORD YEAR FORECAST

An optimistic prediction for building and construction in Quesnel for 1962 suggests a possible total that may reach as high as \$4,000,000, although to date no building permits for the new year have been issued.

Building expenditures expected for 1962 include \$350,000 for a Super Valu Store, and \$760,000 to be spent on a sewage collection and disposal system for the entire Quesnel municipal area.

Other proposals include the Fraser Village Senior Citizens Home; alterations and 50-bed addition for G. R. Baker Memorial Hospital, to be started this year, and a new B.C. Telephone Company building, also to be built this year. In addition, Building Inspector John Neil estimates he will issue approximately one million dollars in permits to cover home, general building and small business construction.

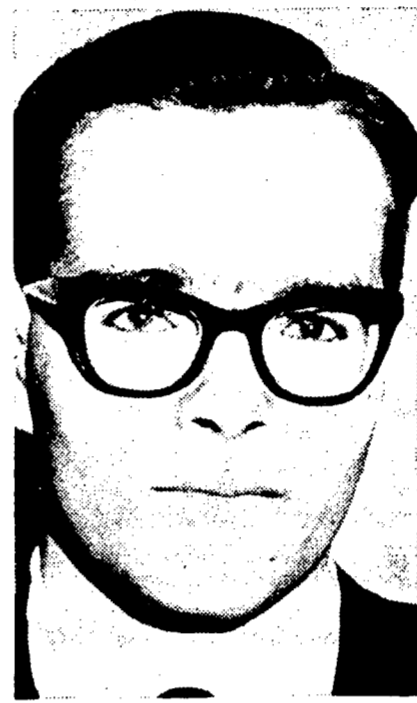
### CALLED TO CALIFORNIA WHEN FATHER KILLED

## Snow Upsets Schedules On First Day of School

## New Years Day Marks Eighty-Sixth Birthday

As pert and sweet as she was when she arrived in Cariboo on Halloween of 1884, is Mrs. Emma Johnson, one of Quesnel's best-loved pioneers, who celebrated her 86th birthday on New Year's Day. Many of her friends called at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Rowlandson to wish her a happy birthday, and in the evening she was entertained at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Paxter of Dragon Lake, where a turkey dinner was enjoyed by the guests.

Mrs. Johnson came to Canada from England when she was eight years old, with her uncle, the late William Pinchbeck, and his bride. They settled at Williams Lake where Mr. Pinchbeck had extensive holdings and the lake, and later the town, were named after him.

In 1897 and 1898 Mrs. Johnson attended school at Barkerville, boarding with the Kelly family. She lived at Soda Creek for several years, helping her first husband, Charles Foyle, operate the ferry there. She can still remember washing sheets for the river steamers by hand in the Fraser River, 90 at a time.

She moved to Quesnel in 1911, and worked as a cook in the first Quesnel Hospital. Here she later met and married the late John D. Johnson. Mrs. Johnson has

always been active in club work, St. Andrew's W.A., Old Age Pensioners, and is an honorary president of the Quesnel Historical Society. She also received the first life membership awarded to a member of the Society and is often called upon to settle disputes concerning pioneer days.

Though hospitalized recently, she is now as spry as ever, and with her prodigious memory entertains her many friends by the hour with Cariboo tales of the 1890s and early 1900s.
